## Message from Director

January is a time for reflecting on what we have done and for looking forward and making new plans. The Probation Service's new strategic plan (2018–2020) is nearing completion. Looking back too, our *Probation works* newsletter is five years old this month. Both this newsletter, and its sister publication (for internal circulation) – *Probation Press* – produced on alternate months, were developed out of suggestions made by numerous Probation Service staff, on the need for more extensive and regular means of communication, both within the Probation Service, as well as with our external stakeholders 'audience.' It is difficult to over-emphasize the importance of communication, for any organisation or individual. Of course, newsletters in and of themselves do not satisfy all our communication needs and requirements. Nevertheless, I would suggest that we should not underestimate the importance and value of something as simple yet as effective as a newsletter, in delivering certain kinds of news and information, in a simple, timely, structured and targeted way.



When we started to publish *Probation works* and *Probation Press*, there were those who wondered whether we would have enough to say, on such a 'frequent' basis. That concern has been proven to be completely unfounded: Probation has many good stories to tell. In this age of increased availability and more immediate access to information via social

media, it is also important for modern organizations to keep up with such developments, and to harness their value for our work. We do now have a Probation Service Twitter account (@probation\_irl). Last Autumn, we launched our 'Probation Works' campaign, on social and other media. The centre piece of that campaign was a series of short videos, featuring a range of speakers from different agencies and backgrounds, describing the value of Probation's work for them. That was a very successful initiative in helping us to get across the 'message' of what probation does, and its role and contribution in the wider Justice system. The task of communication is never done. It is also of course a two-way street, and we always welcome your feedback and input, on issues covered in our newsletters, or anything regarding what we do and how we do it. Over the past five years, numerous readers of our newsletters have commented on our communications and specifically our publication content. Please do keep that feedback coming this year!

The next edition of Probation works will be published in March 2018.

"In the first EuroPris newsletter of 2018, I would like to wish you a happy new year and take the opportunity to reflect upon EuroPris' recent activities and future possibilities.

2017 was a year full of progress and activities. EuroPris arranged a large number of workshops, expert meetings and conferences, some of them being jointly arranged together with other organisations. Collaborations were for example with CEP on a mental health workshop and a foreign nationals expert meeting and with ICPA and CEP on the Technology in Corrections conference. EuroPris started in 2017 two new events - the Correctional Research Conference co-organised with ICPA and the Summer Course in Barcelona, being a joint initiative with the Criminal Justice Platform. Both will see a second edition in 2018."

## Tuam Community Training Centre 30th Anniversary Celebrations

The Confederation of European Probation (CEP) and EuroPris (The European Organisation of Prison and Correctional Services) organised a very successful international expert workshop on Mental Health in Prison and Probation on 6–7<sup>th</sup> December hosted by the Probation Service in Haymarket. Over 80 participants from probation and prison services attended from 19 European jurisdictions and Japan. European prison and probation services are working with an increasing number of people with mental health issues and challenges. The prevalence of mental health problems among prisoners and probationers is considerably higher than in the general community.

The workshop provided a unique opportunity for practitioners in prison and probation, researchers and international experts to meet and share experience, knowledge and best practice. The workshop featured plenary presentations and discussion groups from local and international experts on knowledge, treatment and multi-disciplinary working in correctional settings and in the community.

CEP, Europris and participants expressed special appreciation and thanks to the Probation Service for hosting the workshop and for the warm welcome and hospitality extended. Many participants took the opportunity to learn more about probation in Ireland and meet with staff in Haymarket during their visit. Particular thanks and appreciation are due to staff for their assistance in discussing their work with the visitors.

- The Iveagh Hostel – painting of bedrooms.


