Re-offending by those under Probation Service Supervision: Research Study Published.

The first ever study of re-offending among persons who had been under Probation Supervision or on Community Service was published in November 2012. The study which was carried out by the Probation Service in collaboration with the Central Statistics Office, tracked 3,500 offenders who had been on either Probation or Community Service in 2007 and reviewed their level of reconviction over the following 4 years. The research found that 63% of



offenders tracked in the study did not re-offend. This is reflective of the high quality of supervision provided by probation service staff. We plan to replicate this study in 2013 and future years, in partnership with the Central Statistics Office.

Report of the Working Group on Efficiency Measures in the Criminal Justice System Published

The Working Group on Efficiency Measures in the Criminal Justice System — Circuit and District Courts, which was established in Nov 2011 at the request of the Chief Justice, The Hon. Mrs Justice Susan Denham, and the Minister for Justice & Equality, Mr. Alan Shatter TD, submitted its report to the Chief Justice and the Minister on the 30th November 2012. The group identified and reported on how efficiencies and cost reduction measures could be achieved in the operations of the Circuit and District Court, with particular emphasis on how the agencies in the sector interact with the Courts and with each other. Hot off the Press: Youth Justice in Context by Mairéad Seymour

This book, recently published by Routledge, examines the influence of legislative, organisational, policy and practice issues in shaping what constitutes compliance and how non - compliance is responded to when supervising young offenders in the community. It also addresses the impact of adolescent developmental immaturity and social and personal circumstances in mediating expectations of compliance. The books author, Mairéad Seymour, acknowledges the staff and management of the Probation Service, in her research for this publication and in particular Mairéad commented on the role of Young Persons Probation Officers and Senior Probation Officers who went "above the call of duty in facilitating the research with young people".
